I am looking forward to coming back to Belize in September to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Independence and to meeting the Swiss community there, of course if the sanitary situation allows me to do such a trip.

In these difficult times, I allow myself another time to wish you above all a good health. Be sure that the Embassy and its staff stays anytime at your disposal for any issue you would like to rise with us.

Eric Mayoraz Ambassador of Switzerland to Belize and Mexico

Virtual meeting between Ambassador Mayoraz and Minister Courtenay

As the COVID-19 pandemic still complicated all travel, the first meeting between Foreign Minister Eamon Courtenay and Ambassador Eric Mayoraz took place virtually on 29 March 2021. However, the virtual format did not prevent a comprehensive overview of bilateral relations between Switzerland and Belize nor a frank and cordial discussion.

Minister Courtenay described the relationship between Belize and Switzerland as "strong and close" and thanked the Ambassador for Switzerland's long-standing support for Belizean NGO projects (see article below). He then reported on the economic situation in Belize, which has deteriorated significantly due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as the health situation and access to vaccines.

At the multilateral level, the call was an opportunity to present Switzerland's candidacy to the UN Security Council for the period 2023-2024 and to recall Switzerland's offer to open a Permanent Mission of Belize in Geneva. As it would be possible to accredit the Belizean Ambassador both to international organisations and to the Swiss Confederation, this would allow to strengthen bilateral relations in the future.

Minister Courtenay invited Ambassador Mayoraz to come to Belize in September to celebrate the 40 years anniversary of Belize's independence. Ambassador Mayoraz would be honoured to travel to Belize if the sanitary situation allows.

Human Rights and Development Small-Scale Projects 2021

An important pillar of the Swiss foreign policy is the promotion of the respect of human rights, peace and social welfare in all societies. To contribute to this objective, we work closely with civil society organisations on the ground in order to achieve real improvements in human rights. Moreover, we support vulnerable population groups to adapt to climate change. Therefore, every year, the Embassy supports several Belizean NGOs by financing small-scale projects related to human rights and social development.

This year, we support four diverse and exciting projects in different parts of Belize:

- Through solar units, the NGO *Humana People to People Belize* aims to provide access to clean and affordable energy to approximately 400 direct beneficiaries in the Toledo District. Education sessions about the 2030 Agenda Sustainable Development Goals will be carried out and trainings on the installation and maintenance of the solar units will be organized.
- The Julian Cho Society's project aims at building sound leadership and governance in changing indigeneous communities. At the end of this project the Alcalde system – the governance system of the Maya people – would have increased their availability in the community and as a result generate greater input from women and youth on how to improve decision making at the regional (39 villages) and at the village level as it relates to good governance, representation and participation in decision making.
- After a discussion with village leaders, it was decided that the *Plenty International Belize*'s project would focus on improving the sanitation in Mabil Ha. The goal are to install latrines at each home in Mabil and to develop the capacity of villagers to direct community development enhances through a series of workshops. The project also focuses on the indigenous rights of the villagers.
- The **United Belize Advocacy Movement**'s project aims at advancing reform and civil rights through legal support and political advocacy of LGBT people.

Our next call for projects will open in November 2021. Non-governmental organizations working in human rights and development related fields in Belize that are officially registered are welcome to contact the Embassy of Switzerland (<u>mexicocity@eda.admin.ch</u>) to present their organization and apply for the next call for projects.

Message from John Searle, Honorary Consul of Switzerland in Belize

Dear Swiss Residents in Belize,

It is a pleasure to have the opportunity to address you all in this newsletter. I hope this letter finds each of you well and enjoying the natural beauty of Belize.

This past year permitted more time for reflection, as I'm sure each of us have done. There have likely been some highs and lows, but it has been the opportune time to make adjustments, perhaps take on a new hobby, or spend more free time with family and friends. Hopefully we are on the other end of the Covid pandemic, and can be thankful for passing these past 15 months



in our beautiful Belize, blessed with natural beauty and a relatively small population.

While the Covid Pandemic is still very much a serious issue here in Belize, as it is all over the world, the vaccine is now readily available to anyone who wants it, and I would encourage everyone, especially those with additional risk factors, to take advantage of the vaccine program.

While our economy is slowing recovering, the government is working to implement additional measures to secure continued financial improvement. This is especially complex as a result of the financial constraints due to Covid. Signs of these new measures include the reopening of the international airport with additional flights to Belize resuming each month. More recently the land borders opened to visitors crossing into Belize from Mexico and Guatemala. Additionally, it was recently announced that cruise ships would resumes calls into Belize on July 7th, after more than a year's absence.

Last year was a difficult year for all of us, but even more so for those of you affected by the flooding which was a result of Hurricanes lota and Eta. Thankfully, you were all able to pull through and recover.

Also, last year we were unable to celebrate Swiss National Day due to Covid restrictions, but I'm optimistic that we may be able to meet this year. Especially if we utilize an outdoor venue and have taken the vaccine. Let's keep our fingers crossed and monitor the government's regulations to plan our gathering later this summer.

Due to the Covid Pandemic Ambassador Mayoraz was not able to visit us in Belize last year, but if the Covid numbers continue to remain low, we are hopeful that Ambassador Mayoraz will be able to visit us for the 40th Independence Day Celebrations in September. Hopefully he will have enough time in his schedule to host a visit with the Swiss residents to discuss any issues the Embassy may be able to assist you with.

There is also some exciting news to share. A Swiss owned Belizean company, Solar Energy Solutions Belize (SESB) is partnering with Belize Electricity Company Limited, with funding from the Swiss Government, to provide another remote village with solar powered electricity. Corazon Creek Village, in the Toledo District, will now have electricity thanks to this partnership. This is the second such project that SESB has spearheaded, the first was providing solar electricity to La Gracia Village, in the Cayo District.

In closing, I would like to thank the professional team at the Swiss Embassy in Mexico City for all their support throughout the past year. I would also like to let all the residents know that for me, it is an honor and pleasure to assist you with any issues that arise, and to be your Honorary Swiss Consul. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions, concerns, or issues you may need assistance with, I am only a phone call away.

Happy to present you our virtual counter

Entering your personal details in the Register of the Swiss Abroad, ordering confirmations, announcing civil status matters and subscribing to publications: The FDFA's online desk offers Swiss nationals abroad the opportunity to request services from the comfort of their homes.

The FDFA's online desk simplifies correspondence between Swiss nationals residing abroad and their Swiss representation. The representation is also available for questions about the FDFA's online desk.



Once you have opened an account you can enter your personal details online in the Register of the Swiss Abroad. Once you have registered, you can:

- View your personal details
- Order and pay for a confirmation of your registration and nationality
- Announce civil status matters such as marriages, births, adoptions, changes of names, deaths, etc.
- Announce changes of address
- Registration or de-registration in the electoral register
- Update contact details (phone, email, etc.)
- Order publications (Swiss Review, the representation's newsletter)
- Contact your representation

Proof of life certificate – procedure

The Embassy of Switzerland reminds all Swiss citizens and foreign nationals who receive a pension from the Compensation Office in Geneva to submit their proof of life certificate every year.

It has been a difficult time for everyone, especially for those who have to submit their proof of life. Therefore, understanding this present situation, the Compensation Office continues to authorize persons receiving a pension to fill out the certification form confirming that they are alive, their marital status and address for correspondence in Belize. The document must be dated and signed by the applicant even if it is not stamped by the Swiss Embassy or other governmental authority of Belize. In addition, a copy of a simple testimonial letter (not notarized), signed by the person attesting that the pensioner is alive, must be presented together with a copy of his/her official identity card.

Testimonial letter:

I, the undersigned, (surname/name of witness), certify that Mr/Ms (surname/first name of insured) is alive. Witness' full address:

Both the life certification form and the testimonial letter must be scanned and sent directly via email to the Compensation Office : <u>sedmaster@zas.admin.ch</u>

You can also make your certification of life with the Belizean governmental authorities or the notary with date, signature and stamp of the competent representation whose original has to be sent with a copy of the identity card of the applicant by courier service of your choice to the address of the Swiss Embassy.

The third option is to make an appointment from Monday to Friday from 09:00 to 12:00 at the Embassy of Switzerland in Mexico.

Tobias Gysel has been the academic intern at the Embassy since the beginning of February. He has been a valuable support to the diplomatic Embassy staff, for instance by writing excellent political reports.

What have been your main tasks in this Embassy?

Besides being in charge of the Embassy's social media publications, I had the opportunity to write political reports on various topics, such as the recent elections in Mexico. I was also involved in several projects, such as the events of the *Francophonie* or the exposition *Diseño a toda hora* in the Franz Meyer Museum. All these projects allowed me to get to know many interesting people and to collaborate

with the wonderful team at the Embassy, while working across different topics.

How did you imagine life in Mexico, and how were you surprised?

Although I knew the country relatively well before, this is the first time I've worked here and also the first time I've lived in Mexico City. Besides the excellent food, what I like most is the friendliness and courtesy of the people here in Mexico. The insight into the world of diplomacy and the work of an Embassy has also been extremely exciting and means that I get to see a whole new side of the country. What I was really surprised about was the sheer size of the city, and the difficulties in moving around. Since I was living in London before, I knew how it felt to live in a big city – but Mexico City is a whole new level of experience.

What are your goals and/or next career steps?

My internship at the Embassy will last until the end of June. I will start a PhD at the Università della Svizzera italiana in Lugano, Switzerland in August, which I am really excited about. The program will last four years – but who knows, maybe I will be back in Mexico after that! In any case I will be leaving with a sense of melancholy, since I really had a fantastic time here.

Anette Wittwer – Attachée for political and sectorial affairs

Since the beginning of June, Anette Wittwer is part of the diplomatic staff at the Embassy. She was born in Geneva and is Swiss and Mexican.

How did you come to Mexico?

My dad is Swiss-German and my mum is Mexican and Lebanese. I always knew I would end up living in Mexico at some point. Even if I was born and grew up in Geneva, Switzerland, my mum did a hard



work to make sure her Mexican culture was an important part of my personality. This is why I used to visit my family in Mexico every summer since I was a child. After I obtained my Bachelor and Master degrees in International Relations and Public Policies in Switzerland, I decided, back in 2016, to make a long trip throughout South America. During this trip, I decided I would find a way to move to Mexico and work there for a while, because I wanted to have my own experience of my culture and my country. In January 2018, I started to work at the famous Mexican water company – Rotoplas.

How long have you been in Mexico and what did you do before working at the Embassy?

I have been in Mexico for three and a half years now (wow). Before I moved to Mexico, I had several work experiences at non-profit organizations, NGOs and in the public sector in the domains of refugees and migration related questions, people in situation of vulnerability, education and public health, mainly in Switzerland and in the U.S. I actually never thought I would end up working in the private sector (I imagined myself more working in the humanitarian and development fields), but life sometimes surprises us! During the past three years at Rotoplas, I really learned so much. I worked as a strategic partnerships specialist at the R&D and innovation department with 47 engineers (quite challenging), where I learned a lot about water technologies, project management, business cases, and public relations. Today, I can say that the sustainable management of water has become one of my passions.

Where did your interest for diplomatic work come from?

I was always interested by the sector, because it is a way to combine my passion for politics with the discovery of new cultures, which in turn permits me to exit my comfort zone and continuously reinvent and challenge myself. Actually, after almost 3 years at Rotoplas, I decided to resign because I wanted to go back to a public service area in the domain of human rights and the environment. As you can imagine, this opportunity at the Embassy was really perfect for me, because it focuses exactly on those fields, and it also permits me to link my two beloved cultures. Since early June, I am part of the diplomatic section, and I love to feel that I am in Switzerland while hearing the *voceros* that sell tamales on the streets. The challenging projects I will oversee are really exciting to me, and I hope to serve the Swiss interests in the domain of human rights with humility, perseverance, and above all, a lot of passion.

Cecilia Neyroud – Diplomatic Attachée



Cecilia Neyroud started to work at the Embassy as Diplomatic Attachée at the beginning of January. She is the contact person for Belize.

How did you come to Mexico?

During 2019, I passed the various stages of the admission exam to the diplomatic career. In December 2019, I received one of the most important calls of my life. I learned that I had the honour of being admitted to the diplomatic career alongside 13 other colleagues. We then started our career with

a diplomatic internship of two years, which consists of three blocks: theoretical training, internship in Bern and internship abroad.

Regarding the internship abroad, it was pure chance to land in Mexico City as we could not choose. The Federal Department of Foreign Affairs decided of our appointments. For me, though, it was a great surprise: I was delighted to return to Mexico, a year and a half after coming on a service trip in my previous job during which I had the pleasure of meeting the Ambassador and the Deputy Head of Mission.

What did you do before working at the Embassy?

I studied political science and international relations at the University of Geneva and at the Université catholique de Louvain (Belgium). During my master's, I did an internship for the Ecole polytechnique fédérale de Lausanne (EPFL), one of the best engineering and natural sciences universities in the world. I worked as a Liaison Officer between EPFL's office in Brussels and the campus in Lausanne (Switzerland). With this position, I started to represent a Swiss institution abroad in a very exciting field. After this experience, I moved back to Switzerland and worked several years in the international relations team of the State Secretariat for Education, Research and Innovation. I very much enjoyed working there and trying to help strengthening the ties between Switzerland and other countries in these fields. As becoming a diplomat had always been a dream for me, I decided to apply for the diplomatic career admission. Before coming to Mexico, I worked for six months in the Americas Division at the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs in Berne.

What are your impressions of these first months of work at the Embassy?

I am very glad to have the opportunity to work on a wide variety of projects with various colleagues at the Embassy, ranging from culture and economy to human rights issues and writing political reports, to name a few. These first few months have really confirmed my choice: I am learning a lot and having a lot of fun discovering my country of assignment. I am also delighted to slowly be able to meet people for real. Indeed, meeting new people from different backgrounds is, in my opinion, one of the great riches of being a diplomat.

I am very lucky to have been entrusted with the Belize dossier. It is a great opportunity for me to discover more about Belize and I really hope to have the chance to visit it in the coming months!

Almost five years ago, just graduated from my master's, I started working at the Swiss Embassy in Mexico.
