

# Switzerland's Support to WFP Operations in DPR Korea

#### Switzerland and WFP

 Since 2011, Switzerland has supported WFP's operations around the world with more than US\$ 407 million, of which US\$ 57 million has been disbursed in 2016. In 2016 alone, Switzerland has supported more than 23 WFP operations with directed contributions, including DPR Korea.

#### Switzerland and WFP DPRK

 Switzerland is the largest donor of WFP in DPRK. Between 2002 and 2016, Switzerland has contributed US\$ 52 million to WFP DPRK. The below table gives an overview of all of Switzerland's donations between 2002 and 2016.

### Switzerland's most recent contributions to WFP operations in DPRK

- In 2016, WFP received a total of US\$ 8 million which has been used to procure 2,047 mt of Dried Skimmed Milk (DSM). With the DSM, WFP will produce 20,841 mt of corn and wheatbased fortified cereals and 8,410 mt of fortified biscuits. This will benefit 650,000 young children and mothers in 60 counties and nine provinces for ten months.
- WFP still expects 1,230 mt of DSM to arrive in Nampo in six different shipments in mid-December 2016 and in February 2017.
- In 2015, Switzerland contributed a total of US\$ 6.7 million to WFP's previous operation (PRRO 200532), to procure 1,050 mt of DSM. Together with other ingredients, the DSM was used for the production of 12,600 mt of fortified cereals that benefited 663,734 young children and mothers.
- Switzerland donated an additional cash contribution to WFP in 2015 of US\$ 760,000, which was used to purchase 1,395 mt of maize. The maize helped WFP to reach 663,734 young children and mothers for 35 days.

## **Previous Field visits by Swiss representatives**

Field visits by SDC-representatives take place on a regular basis, including to local food production factories, warehouses as well as child institutions and household visits.
