A Piece of Sky, by Swiss director Michael

Koch, is Switzerland's submission to in the International Feature Film category at the 95th Academy Awards. The film premiered at this year's Berlinale Film Festival, with its Swiss premiere at the Locarno Film Festival, and a cinematic release in Switzerland on September 1. The film tells an exceptional love story set in a remote mountain village in the Swiss Alps, between Anna, who grew up in the village, and Marco, an outsider hired as a farmhand. As their relationship is put to the test, age-old tensions in the community erupt.

What you need:

5 Cups	Pasta, cooked
1 3/4 Cups	Cream
3 Oz	Tomato paste (around 5 tbsp)
¼ Cup	Parmesan cheese, finely grated



longer than 20-30 min.

Seemingly Italian, but Swiss at heart, *cinque pi* is a delicious pasta recipe using the five Italian P's *panna* (cream), *pomodoro* (tomatoes), *parmigiano* (parmesan), *prezzemolo* (parsley), and *pepe* (pepper)—to create the most delicious and creamy pasta dish. The recipe is not only delicious but also very quick: the preparation should not take no

Nutmeg, salt and pepper Bunch of parsley, chopped finely, plus a couple of leaves for garnishing

Directions:

1. Cook the pasta according to the package instructions.

2. Meanwhile, in a large pot, bring the cream carefully to a boil, then reduce the heat to low, and whisk in the tomato puree. Cook for about 5-10 minutes, or until the cream thickens.

3. Whisk the cheese and seasonings into the cream sauce.

4. Add the sauce to the cooked, drained pasta and stir to coat, garnishing with parsley.
