Humanitarian aid

as immediate assistance for those affected by the conflict in Ukraine and in neighbouring countries.

Winter Aid supports the urgent rehabilitation of Ukraine's energy infrastructure and basic supply systems. The aid is also directed at Moldova.

Development cooperation

The budget of the Swiss programme for international cooperation in Ukraine doubled in 2022 and 2023; the project has been adapted significantly to the current situation.

Peace and human rights

for peace and human rights-related projects, with a focus on accountability and protecting civilians.

Multilateral support

Support for organisations such as the World Bank and the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), which use their own funds to ensure that public service employees in Ukraine continue to be paid, or that SMEs become more competitive.

Investments in supporting tech start-ups are made via the Ukrainian HORIZON fund.

The 2023 Action Plan provides for measures in the areas of peacebuilding (e.g. demining), health (e.g. repairs hospitals), economic development (e.g. small loans for agricultural SMEs), sustainable cities (e.g. repair of schools) and multi-sectoral support (e.g. delivery of requested material).

Recovery process

Ukraine Recovery Conference in Lugano, involving 41 states and 18 international organisations: Switzerland and Ukraine initiate the political process of Ukraine's recovery on a broad basis. The Lugano Declaration sets out the framework. The Lugano Principles provide common benchmarks for the future.
